A Study in 1 Peter Notes on the Author, Background and Theme

Author- The author of 1 Peter is **Peter** the **Apostle**, the same Peter who loved and followed Jesus in the Gospel accounts, and the same Peter that denied Jesus three times the night of His crucifixion. This is the Peter that Jesus **lovingly restored** on the shores of **Galilee** a few weeks after His **Resurrection** from the dead. Peter was recognized as the **author** of this book by the **early church** as far back as 95AD. The themes and concepts in the book, as well as the experiential knowledge of the author are all consistent with the life of Peter as we know it. Peter of course was the out spoken and fiercely loval leader of the 12 disciples. Dear Church family, aren't we grateful to God that he **penned** this letter to instruct the church for years to come with such a vivid account of our great salvation and the Christian Life? Peter's Christology is very High, exalting Christ and lifting up our awesome Savior to His rightful place in our affections. His **Soteriology** is rich, giving us a penetrating and insightful catalog of many of the great doctrines of Salvation. Peter's Ecclesiology gives us an enlightening and instructive understanding of the Church! His teaching on the **Christian life** is **simple** and **clear**. Thank God for this wonderful gift and legacy from our brother and **friend** the Apostle Peter!

Background and Theme - In the mid to late 1st Century the church and been scattered abroad when Jerusalem, along with its Jewish Temple was destroyed in 70AD by the Romans. This of course meant that all Jewish and Gentile believers had been thrust out of Judea almost completely, and dispersed into the Roman and Greek world which surrounded the Mediterranean Sea. In fact, Peter addresses his letter to "those who reside as aliens, scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and **Bithynia."** These are the provinces of what is today Northern Turkey which were at that time, Greek by culture, but under Roman rule. The Greek word he uses for "scattered" is the word diaspora which means, "scattered" or "dispersed" or a "dispersion." This combined with the very zealous and successful evangelistic efforts of the Apostles, had called out Christian believers in much of the Roman world. You can see the **image** here then, in a way, of "scattered" believers who have come to "reside as aliens" in a very heathen, polytheistic Greek and Roman world. This also informs us of the Historical context of the letter, that these believers lived in world rather hostile to the monotheistic and morally upright teachings of Christ and His Church. The church therefore finds herself in a world where animosity, persecution, and suffering were the common experience of everyday life. And so then is the Christian life of believers down through the ages unto this

very day, living as **aliens** in a **foreign land**. A land that neither **loves** our **Christ**, nor His holy and beautiful **wisdom** and **way of life**. Peter shines bright light on our **role** as **pilgrims** in a strange land, **waiting** for the **homecoming** of our **Lord** who will in fact make **all things new** in this broken fallen world.

Themes present in 1 Peter: The main theme stated in a sentence. "Those who persevere in faith while suffering persecution should be full of hope, for they will certainly enjoy end-time salvation since they already enjoy God's saving promises here and now through the death and resurrection of Christ." Many people have believed through the centuries that Peter actually gives one of the best primers, or manuals, on the basics of Christianity. It has if you will in its contents, all the instruction a Christian needs to understand the basics of life in the Kingdom of God, and how to live as a citizen of Heaven in an unbelieving world. If you think about the different sections of Peters 2 books, they really are quite comprehensive in all the instruction they give us. It's a great book to use in discipling a new believer.

Consider just a few of its themes;

- Those who suffer as Christians will be exalted by God and strengthened by Christ.
- The Church has a unique identity as the new people of God in a spiritual priesthood of all believers.

- Believers now have a living hope that guides us to an end-time inheritance of glory and contentment.
- Christ died as a sacrifice for our sins and this is the basis of our new life in Him.
- Christ's suffering is an example for us and teaches us how to live as God's own people.
- The **resurrection** of **Christ** is the **basis** of our **hope** and His victory over His enemies.
- Christians should **live** a life of **love** and **holiness** in their homes, in the church, and in the world.

Peter's letter is filled with many riches and promises that God has given to us in and through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. These we call indicatives. They indicate beautiful and powerful realities that we have in Christ. Peter also gives us many commands and instructions that are proper for our lives as the new people of God. These we call imperatives. They call us to our specific roles and duties as pilgrims waiting for Christ's return and living for His glory while we wait. 1 Peter is a very rich a beautiful gift from God to the church that strengthens our faith, empowers our hope, teaches us to love, and shows us how to glorify God and enjoy Him forever. Let us pay careful attention to this Heaven sent Word as we work our way through it!
